**Please provide the following information on Party TIME & MILES in the table below.**

A Party is any group of people birding together, or even one person birding alone. If the same group is together all morning and stays together all afternoon, that's one party. But if the same people are together all morning, then later they split up into 2 groups, they become two new parties. That group had a total of 3 parties that day (one in the morning and two in the afternoon). It does NOT matter how many people are in each party. All of the CBC statistics are based on "parties", not "people". Keep it simple. . . Don't make it more difficult than it needs to be.

**Start Time and End Time:** Enter when each party started and ended

**Party-hours and miles:** Estimate how much of your effort was on foot, in a vehicle, or on a boat. "Night" is before 6:30 AM or after 5:30 PM. Keep nighttime activities (owling & raling) separate from daytime. If you took any long breaks (like an hour for lunch), subtract that from your total hours.
